

Wildlife Watching and Photography

The Grand Tetons are home to an incredible array of wildlife. Visitors may encounter bison, moose, elk, and black bears while exploring the park. Birdwatchers will appreciate the chance to spot bald eagles, osprey, and trumpeter swans.

Photographers flock to the region to capture iconic images of the Tetons reflected in the waters of Jenny Lake or Snake River. The Mormon Row Historic District is another popular spot, offering picturesque views of old homesteads against the mountain backdrop.

Water Activities and Scenic Drives

Jackson Lake and Jenny Lake provide opportunities for boating, kayaking, and paddle-boarding. Fishing is also a favorite pastime, with the Snake River offering some of the best trout fishing in the country.

For those who prefer a scenic drive, the Teton Park Road and the Signal Mountain Summit Road offer breathtaking panoramas of the mountains and surrounding valleys. The 42-mile Scenic Loop Drive


takes visitors through some of the park’s most iconic landscapes.


exception. Jackson is home to a variety of dining options, from casual eateries to upscale restaurants featuring locally sourced ingredients.

The Snake River Grill is a beloved fine-dining establishment offering creative dishes like buffalo tartare and fresh Idaho trout. The Million Dollar Cowboy Steakhouse, located inside the famous Million Dollar Cowboy Bar, serves up hearty Western fare in a setting steeped in history.

For a more rustic experience, Dornan's in Moose is a must-visit, with a deck overlooking the Tetons and a menu featuring delicious wood-fired pizzas and locally brewed beers.

Unique Facts and Must-See Attractions

One of the most unique aspects of the Grand Tetons is their dramatic rise from the valley floor, with no

foothills to obstruct the view. This stark contrast creates one of the most photographed mountain ranges in the world.

Another fascinating feature is the park's connection to Yellowstone National Park. The two parks are only a short drive apart, making it easy for travelers to explore both in one trip.

For those interested in history, the Menor's Ferry Historic District offers a glimpse into early homesteading life in Jackson Hole. The nearby Craig Thomas Discovery and Visitor Center provides insightful exhibits about the park's natural and cultural history.
